
Keynote Speech by Professor Conal McCarthy



Guided Tour of the Ruins of St Andrews Castle, Cathedral and St Rule's Tower*

Led by Historic Environment Scotland Guides

St Andrews Castle ruins are steeped in the Scottish Reformation's struggle for hearts and minds. The castle served as a bishop's palace, fortress, and state prison across its 450-year history. Construction of St Rule's Cathedral began in 1160 by Bishop Arnold, continuing for 150 years. However, storms in 1272 and the Scottish War of Independence halted progress. St Rule's Tower, at 33m tall, became a pilgrim site for St Andrew's shrine and now offers unique views across the Royal Burgh. *Please note that accessing St Rule's Tower is subject to good weather conditions, access is by a narrow and steep medieval staircase. There is no disabled access.





Venue & Host




